

The Salmon People

The Salmon People print is based on a painting that hangs at North Vancouver District Public Library's Capilano Library. The original painting of *The Salmon People*, created in 2013, is rich in symbolism from the Squamish Nation.

Latash depicts five swimming fish, which represent the five types of salmon in the Pacific Ocean – Sockeye, Chinook, Coho, Chum and Pink. In the foreground are three reeds, light green in color, a symbol which repeats three times. This is symbolic of the rich bounty of the sea from which the salmon draw their nourishment. Across the top of the work is a blue wave which symbolizes the vast ocean in which the salmon swim. It is a continuous cycle of life which is celebrated by the Squamish people.
